	Does the essay contain a clear thesis? Does it answer the questioned being asked of me? Have I
	taken a definitive stance I wish to argue in favor of?
	Does my introduction clearly state my thesis, and does it prepare the reader for what they are about
	to read?
Argumentation/Outline:	
	Are the points of my argument clear and well defined?
	Is the argument well organized? Does it develop the thesis as a necessary conclusion?
	Does my argument have enough research to support its points?
	Is every paragraph unified by a strong topic sentence or topic idea? Does each paragraph lead
	logically to the next?
Research:	
	Does my argument have enough research to support its points?
Conclus	ion:
	Does my conclusion summarize my argument and point back to my thesis?
	Is the conclusion effective? Do I move beyond a summary to make thoughtful comments on the
	implications of my argument? Do I leave the reader with something to think about?
Citation	<u>t</u>
	Are all sources accurately quoted and adequately supported?
	Have I cited those sources properly? Do they match the proscribed style for this course?
Style:	
	Is my style clear and concise?
	Do I generally use the active and not the passive voice?
	Have I eliminated unnecessary words?
	Is the essay title interesting or at least informative?
