I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

A study of pivotal methods and interpretative principles involved in discerning the meaning of the Biblical text. Topics covered include essential steps in interpreting the Bible, the variety of methods and approaches available to the contemporary student of Scripture, historical and theological issues arising out of the interpretative task, the relationship between the testaments, word studies, discourse analysis, and literary genre. Students learn to use the standard tools of advanced Biblical research.

C. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

A penalty of 1% per day will be applied to all late assignments

- 1. Readings and Group Discussion (10%):
 - Students are required to complete the weekly reading according to the class content and to prepare for the discussion questions before each class.

- Students are expected to attend the group discussion for 20 minutes in each class and to make contributions to the understanding of the topics. Students' comments and questions should reflect a thorough and thoughtful reading of the materials.

2. Role-Play Presentation (10%):

- Each group, consisting of three students, will select one literary genre found in the Bible, explain the distinctive features of the chosen genre and the appropriate interpretive method(s) associated with it, and demonstrate the interpretation of a selected biblical passage from the chosen genre through a 15 minutes role-play scenario.
- All three group members are expected to contribute equally and actively participate in the role-play presentation.
- The literary genre is to be selected on Sept 16. Role-play will be presented on Sept 30, Oct 7, 14.
- Learning outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5

3. OT Proposal Presentation (5%):

- Students will present their proposals of the OT exegetical paper for 5 minutes and lead the class discussion for another 5 minutes.
- OT proposals will be presented on **Oct 28, Nov 4, 11**.
- Learning outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5

4. OT Exegetical Paper (35%):

- Each student will write an exegetical paper of an OT passage for approximately 4,000 words. The exegetical paper should focus on both the ancient text and its contemporary relevance. As an academic paper, it should have a clear and welldefined thesis statement that is defended throughout the paper.
- The passage of the exegetical paper is to be agreed upon with the instructor by Sept 16. The exegetical paper is due in .pdf form at 11:59 p.m., Nov 18.

5. NT Proposal Presentation (5%):

- Students will present their proposals of the NT exegetical paper for 5 minutes in class and lead the class discussion for another 5 minutes.
- The proposals will be presented on **Nov 18, 25, Dec 2**.
- Learning outcomes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5

6. NT Exegetical Paper (35%):

Each student will write an exegetical paper of a NT passage for approximately
4,000 words. The exegetical paper should focus on both the ancient text and its

contemporary relevance. As an academic paper, it should have a clear and welldefined thesis statement that is defended throughout the paper.

- The passage of the exegetical paper is to be agreed upon with the instructor by Sept 16. The exegetical paper is due in .pdf form at 11:59 p.m., Dec 9.

Turnitin Text-Matching Software

Tyndale has a subscription to Turnitin, a text-matching software that ensures the originality of academic writing and verifies the proper citation of all sources. The instructor for this course will use Turnitin for assignments submitted through your course resource page at classes.tyndale.ca. Upon submission, you will receive a summary that includes your submitted files along with a similarity report generated by Turnitin. Please be aware that Turnitin can also detect AI-generated content from tools like Grammarly, so students should be mindful of when

using such software. It's advisable to confirm with your instructor before using any AI tools into your assignments. Below are some useful resources:

Research Ethics

All course-based assignments involving human participants requires ethical review and may require approval by the <u>Tyndale Research Ethics Board (REB)</u>. Check with the Seminary Dean's Office (<u>aau@tyndale.ca</u>) before proceeding.

Late Papers and Extensions Policy

All papers and course assignments must be submitted by the due dates indicated in the course syllabus. Unless the instructor already has a policy on grading late papers in the course syllabus, grades for papers submitted late without an approved extension will be lowered at the rate of two-thirds of a grade per week or part thereof (e.g., from "A+" to "A-," from "B" to "C+"). Please note that some programs, such as cohort-based or intensive courses, may follow a different policy due to the nature of the program.

Faculty may not grant an extension beyond the last day of exams for the semester. Requests for extensions beyond this date must be addressed in writing to the Registrar by filling out the <u>Extension Request Form</u>. The application will be considered only in cases such as a death in the family, medical emergency, hospitalization of oneself or immediate family member or prolonged illness requiring treatment by a physician. Factors such as assignments for other courses, holidays, and technology-related difficulties are insufficient grounds for requesting an extension.

A temporary grade of incomplete ("I") may be granted by the Registrar.
