I. COURSE DESCRIPTION

An examination of the life and thought of John Wesley, and of early Methodism as a movement of evangelism, renewal and mission within the larger Christian Church. Students will explore major aspects of Wesley's theology and the dynamics of early Methodism as a movement, with attention to how Wesley's theology can help inform a holistic understanding of Christian life and mission in the contemporary context.

II. LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Discuss the major themes of John Wesley's theology and relate these themes to events in his life and ministry.
- 2. Analyze early Methodism as a movement of renewal and evangelism.
- 3. Engage in close, critical, and charitable reading of primary source material relevant to Wesley's life and theology.
- 4. Critically evaluate and discuss a particular area of Wesley studies in detail.

Much of the course reading will be focused on Wesley's sermons, which are available in multiple places online. I recommend <u>the pdf file of the sermons from the Christian Classics</u> <u>Ethereal Library</u>.

D. GUIDELINES FOR INTERACTIONS

E. ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

Please note: Attendance during the online discussion weeks in this course is demonstrated by regular log-ins and up-to-date participation in forums.

1. Online Group Discussions (30%).

All students will participate in four online group discussions during the following weeks: Feb. 13-17, Feb. 27-Mar. 3, Mar. 6-10, and Mar. 27-31 (see the <u>course schedule</u> below). Following our livestream discussions on January 27, the class will be divided into groups of four or five. These groups will remain fixed for the duration of the course. The purpose of the discussions is to engage the content of the course and explore the implications of the material covered for

discipleship and ministry. The instructor will post a question each week for group reflection. Students are expected to post their own response by 11:55 PM (Eastern Time) on Tuesday evening of the week in question, and then reply to the reflections of each of the other students in their group by 11:55 PM (Eastern Time) on Thursday of that same week. Your individual contributions to these discussions will be assessed on a weekly basis.

2. Students can choose <u>one</u> of the following options:

a) Critical book review (30%; 5-6 pages, double-spaced; due 11:55 PM on Feb. 11). Students will write a critical book review of the Thorsen text. The review should demonstrate a clear understanding of the author's argument and a critical evaluation of its strengths and weaknesses.

b) Research Paper Proposal (30%, 3-4 pages plus bibliography, due 11:55 PM on Feb. 11).

This proposal should include a statement of the topic, a tentative thesis, an outline of the major sections of your paper with a brief description of each section, and a preliminary bibliography. The outline will help you to get a good start on the paper, and will provide the instructor with an opportunity to give you feedback before you have finished your work.

3. Research Paper (40%; 10-12 pages, double-spaced; due 11:55 PM on April 8).

Students will write a research paper on an aspect of John Wesley's theology and/or practice as discussed in class. Papers should demonstrate rigorous engagement with primary and secondary sources, an awareness of Wesley's context, and sensitivity to his overall theological perspective. A list of potential topics will be provided in class.

Turnitin Text-Matching Software

Tyndale has a subscription to text-matching software called Turnitin. This software can be used by students to ensure the originality of academic writing and check all of the sources used have been cited correctly. The use of this software in a course is at the discretion of faculty. instructor for this course will be using this software for the assignments that are submitted through your course resource page at <u>classes.tyndale.ca</u>. When you submit your assignment, you will see a summary of your submission, which includes the file(s) that you submitted as well as a similarity report generated by Turnitin. The software works by comparing text with documents submitted by other students, published works, and a range of other sources including online text and generates an originality report. Submissions are stored on a server in the United States and subject to potential review. The software does not make academic judgements about plagiarism; the instructor will evaluate the originality report together with the submitted text and decisions about plagiarism will be made in accordance with Tyndale's academic policy.

H. GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR THE SUBMISSION OF WRITTEN WORK

Assignments are to be uploaded to the assignment submission section of the course page in pdf or Microsoft Word format by 11:55 PM (Eastern Time) on the assigned due date. Papers submitted after 11:55 PM on the due date will receive a 1/3 grade deduction (i.e., B+ to B) for each day (or part thereof) following the due date. This late policy will apply to all assignments for which no extension has been granted. Extensions will be granted only for serious personal, family, or health situations.

Assignments should be double-spaced, in 12 pt Times New Roman font, with 1" margins. The standard citation method for theological papers is **full footnotes with a complete bibliography** in the <u>Chicago style</u>, as explained in the <u>popular guidebook written by Kate L. Turabian</u>. For proper citation style, consult the <u>tip sheet</u>, "Documenting Chicago Style" (Tyndale e-resource) or the full edition of the <u>Chicago Manual of Style</u> Online, especially ch. 14. For citing scripture texts, refer to sections 10.44 to 10.48 and 14.238 to 14.241 from the <u>Chicago Manual of Style</u> or reference the <u>tip sheet</u>, "How to Cite Sources in Theology".
